

Dear Members,

It is my pleasure to present to you the 23/24 Equestrian Tasmania Annual Report.

This year has been a busy year for Equestrian Tasmania, ensuring that we as an organisation are maintaining our regulatory compliance and supporting the sports and members.

This year we have taken steps to ensure we have a gender diverse board compliant with the Active Tasmania requirements which in turn secured our 2024 funding. We have also completed the Sport Australia GAMEPLAN selfassessment which has provided us with and overview of areas in that we can improve and subsequently additional strategies that can feed into the ETAS Strategic Plan.



This year we undertook a major review of our financial systems, consolidating our accounts and simplifying our accounting processes, this has enabled us to provide simpler reporting and a greater level of transparency as well as cost savings through migrating our financial systems to new software platform. Another key achievement has been our Child Safeguarding project to ensure we comply with the Child and Youth Safe Principles, ETAS will soon be launching a range of resources that will support our affiliates, clubs, officials, coaches, members, parents to ensure Child Safeguarding becomes second nature and part of our everyday culture. ETAS has also been an active participant on the Nominate Working Group, this has enabled us to help improve access for members and administrators nationally, ETAS has also been involved on developing a requirements document for the EA IT reform project.

Again, this year the Equestrian Tasmania Championships were successfully hosted by the Sport Affiliates including a successful Horse of the Year run by Show Horse.

Interschool continues to attract strong interest and participation, with a team travelling to Werribee in Sept/Oc 2023. Many thanks to Sue Goldfinch for her dedication and support of the Interschool program both as the Team Manager and National Interschool Committee member. Sue was supported by Jo McFarlane as Team Coach providing our team with the best possible opportunities. During the competition season Sue has then support and navigated riders to apply for the 2024 team.

Our State based Coaching Committee continues to provide our coaches with initiatives for professional development and support through the various accreditation pathways. We are also fortunate to have the highly respected and credentialled Susan Andrews as a representative on the National Coaching Committee.

Our Medication Control team continue conduct swabs at all our Championships and now have funding to swab at other events through out the year. The management committee looking after the Tasmanian Equestrian Centre on behalf of ETAS continue to do a wonderful job, a ETAS Sport Develipment grant also allowed them to further improve the facilities for our membership.

This year we were pleased to be able to host the ETAS Ball in the Country Club Casino in Launceston, again it was a hugely successfully event thanks to the dedicated organising committee whose efforts made it a great success, it would be wonderful to be able to continue and make the 2025 ball even greater.

I must thank the ETAS Board for all their hard work and commitment to supporting the Equestrian Sport in Tasmania it is an absolute pleasure to be able to work with such a wonderful group of people, I have appreciated their support.

Finally, the ETAS Office cannot go with out mention and our Manager Lynsey, Lynsey's commitment and professionalism is second to none and has been a driving force behind the success ETAS has had and made my role as Chair so much easier.

ETAS were a member of the Nominate Working Group during 2023-2024 which developed a new online horse transfer process, as well as help implementing changes to the General Regulations to allow digital copies of registrations and licences to be accepted, removing the need for paper copies and slow processes due to postage of certificates.

Sport Development Grants



In 2023 ETAS we able to offer a range of sport development grants across the areas of club development, volunteers and coaching and officials training to help develop the sport. Below is a summary of the grants delivered in 2023.

Jumping Kingborough/ South/ North

Jumping Kingborough, South and North all received grants to enable them to purchase equipment including light weight wings, replacing old steel ones which were also a health and safety issue for officials and volunteers moving them during set up. Easier equipment also means happier volunteers. They were also able to purchase new cups and poles to meet new national specifications improving safety at all levels. The lighter weight equipment also makes it easier for it to be transported so the equipment at can be used at various venues.

STEA

STEA received funds to develop an unused section of the TEC cross country course, so that the footing is fit for purpose. The new area saw increased options for cross country course tracks/design, furthering options for training and increased member engagement.

TEC

TEC received a grant for two grandstands for the Capricorn Arena, creating a safe space for spectators to view the arena activities. In conjunction with the grant TEC also installed a portable toilet in this area.

Show Horse

Show Horse received a grant to purchase two sets of portable arena surrounds to be used at statewide at ETAS show horse events. The arenas give the ability to delineate warm up and competition areas creating safer surrounds.



Active Tasmania Grant



In 2023 ETAS received a Sport Development Grant from Active Tasmania. These funds were distributed (seperate to the ETAS Sport Development Grants) to support the development of the sport.

Creating a Child Safe Sport *IT'S EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY*

Our commitment

Equestrian Tasmania is committed to child safety, we believe children, young people and all members should feel safe, included, encouraged and supported.

In 2023 we worked to ensure all officials and coaches have current working with vulnerable people cards and held two online sessions as an introduction to Child and Young People Safeguarding.

In 2023/2024 we are doing further development of resources to support all members, volunteers, club affiliates, coaches and officials to help deliver a safe sport and to ensure compliance with the National Child and Young People Safe Principles.

ETAS operate under the EA Policies and Procedures including the Safeguarding policy. A new Safe Sport Hub will launch late 2025 to support this important area.





Dressage Tasmania

As well as competitions, clubs have been holding a variety of training days, a combined training series, working bees and meetings to plan the season ahead.

TEA hosted a well-attended TD/CD workshop with Roger Kane and Ewan Kellett which was held at TEC in April in conjunction with the Southern Eventing Champs and we had 2 attendees at the EAEC meeting in Sydney.

Members of the Tasmanian eventing squad had some great training opportunities with interstate coaches - Emily Anker, Prue Barrett and Sonja Johnson. Thanks go to Sue Goldfinch for coordinating the squad again this year. We also have a Tasmanian rider, Mackenzie Walch, on the Equestrian Australia Eventing Talent Identification Youth Squad.

Two Tasmanian registered eventers were selected on the Australian Young Rider Team to compete on their own horses at the CCI3* event at the Oceania Championships in New Zealand – Bethany Hirst (now based in NSW) and Mackenzie Walch.

Tasmanian riders have also ventured across Bass Strait to compete with much success. Georgia Elias had a well-deserved 2nd place in CCI2*L* at the 2023 Melbourne International 3DE.

Bronte McShane, Hunter Palfreyman, Chloe Daun, Ruby Hirst and Mackenzie Walch also had successful campaigns interstate.

It's been wonderful to so many Tasmanian supporters coming over to support our riders at these bigger events. Now we just need the new Spirit of Tasmania ferries, so that trying to find space on a sailing becomes a less stressful matter!

Tasmanian Equestrian Centre



Throughout the past year, the Tasmanian Equestrian Centre has been a hive of activity, experiencing both challenges and triumphs. In November, a significant incident occurred when a large tyre fire erupted at the western end of the grounds due to the unlawful dumping of car tyres some years ago.

Extensive resources and effort have been dedicated to the removal and proper disposal of this waste, although progress has been slow due to the unavoidably substantial costs and regulations involved the works is now nearly complete.

On a more positive note, the summer season was marked by the successful hosting of numerous championship events. State squad clinics in various disciplines were held on the Capricorn, attracting a high turnout of participants.

The Showjumping state championships in January and the state dressage championships in March were both well-attended, showcasing the park's versatility as an equestrian venue.



In April, the Pony Club organised the state PC dressage and showjumping championships, drawing a huge number of entries and utilising all areas of the grounds very effectively. This was followed by the STEA Southern Eventing Championships, which once again involved significant enhancements to the cross-country course, reflecting ongoing efforts from both STEA and Pony Club to continue to improve and develop their cross country facilities for competitors.

The Capricorn arena continues to be a popular area for the rapidly growing ETAS Show Horse competitors, with regular ETAS Show horse training sessions, junior squad lessons and competitions maximising its usage.

Regular activities at the Capricorn arena have also contributed to the park's increasing usage and income.





Park Development

TEC has implemented notable improvements to the grounds over the past year including:

- 24 new day yards for improved access to the Capricorn arena
- enhancements to road and parking areas with future works hopefully to be continued
- installation of two small grandstands for spectator safety and comfort thanks to an ETAS sport development grant
- a new fenced warm-up grass area next to the Capricorn arena
- Ongoing drainage improvements and clearing have contributed to a more functional and weather-resistant park environment. It is significantly noticeable during big rain events how much this work has improved some areas such as the carpark and around toilet facilities.
- purchase of a new porta-loo for convenience at the Capricorn arena
- a small wing trailer to facilitate the setup of jumps on the arena and
- pipe works completed in the Club rooms and;
- a new water cylinder being put in the club rooms kitchen.

Sponsorship from Waratah Fencing has led to the installation of safer fencing around the ETAS measuring and swabbing shed, enhancing safety and accessibility for users. A new lane way has also been created using the flexi rail towards what will one day be the second car park area.

TEC is proud of the progress they have made this year and is excited to witness future growth in the park for all riders to enjoy.

Overall, the park is evolving into a more cohesive and user-friendly space for events of all sizes and there are many projected improvements on the horizon. TEC remains committed to ongoing development and improvement of the grounds and common use areas, with a focus on enhancing the overall user experience.

With grant monies from Active Tasmania, Coaching Tasmania has been able to provide a number of professional development days utilising some very respected presenters. These we have been able to provide at no cost to EA registered coaches and include:

- June 2023 Coach update and PD at CVEC
- Oct/Nov/Dec 2023 Three Vet in the Valley Zoom presentations covering topics including gastric ulcers and horse welfare. With permission from Active Tas, we were able to make these available nationally to all EA coaches
- May 2024 Coach update and PD farrier presentation by Kirstin Johnson, Mossvale Farrier Service
- June 2024 Large Animal Rescue presentations by international expert Anton Phillips, held in Launceston and Hobart. These were attended by coaches, vets, SES, police and Tas Racing representatives.

Coach Development

With the support of our Coach Educators our four Level 2 candidates are progressing, at different rates, with their training.

Jo McFarlane has been granted a TIS coaching scholarship and is using this to further her career in coaching to become a Level 3 General which would mean four L3 coaches in Tasmania, such a great accomplishment considering our population! This bodes well for the future of coaching in Tasmania.

Promoting Coaching

In May 2024 several EA coaches took part in coaching activities and demonstrations at Agfest. These sessions were well received and created opportunities to discuss the coaching pathways.

(a) Basis of Accounting

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (TAS).

Committee members have determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements are in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (TAS) and the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to non-reporting entities, which the Committee members have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless stated otherwise and include the following:

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes.

(b) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under the current provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act and accordingly no expense has been charged or liability included in the accounts with respect to income tax.

(c) Plant & Equipment

Items of plant and equipment are brought to account at cost and depreciated over their useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(d) Investments

Investments are valued at cost, and interest is accrued on a daily basis.

(e) Goods and Service Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australia Taxation Office (ATO).
